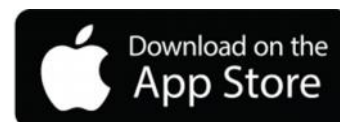

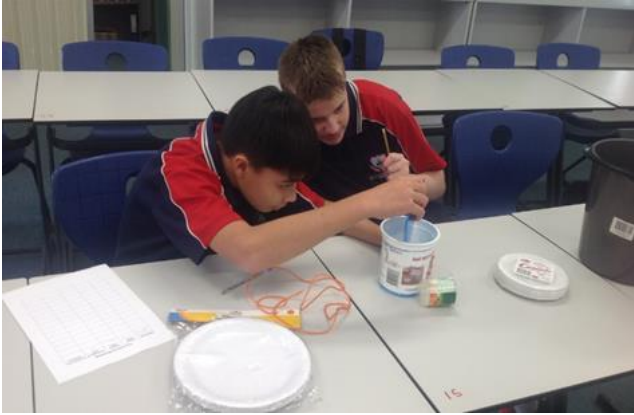

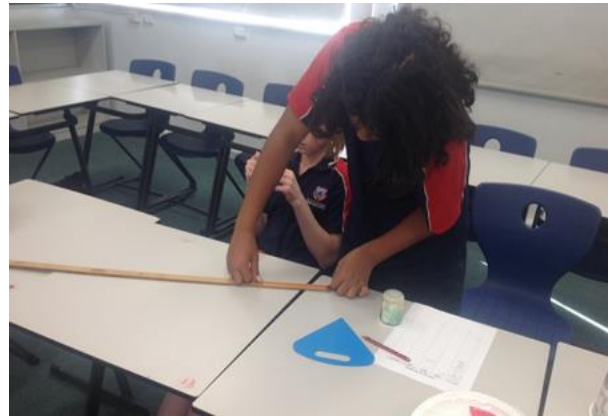
MATHEMATICS

Maths Talent Quest

Dr. Evans Okan has facilitated the formal registration of the Mathematics learning area in a Maths Talent Quest, a mentoring program organised by Mathematical Association of Western Australia (MAWA) for students from Year 7 to 12.

The Maths Talent Quest (MTQ) program aims to promote an interest in using Mathematics and fostering positive attitudes among students, teachers, and parents.

As a pilot program in KSHS, six Year 9 students have indicated their interest in the program. Our expectation is to commence mentoring these students at the start of term 3 to adequately prepare them for competitions throughout.

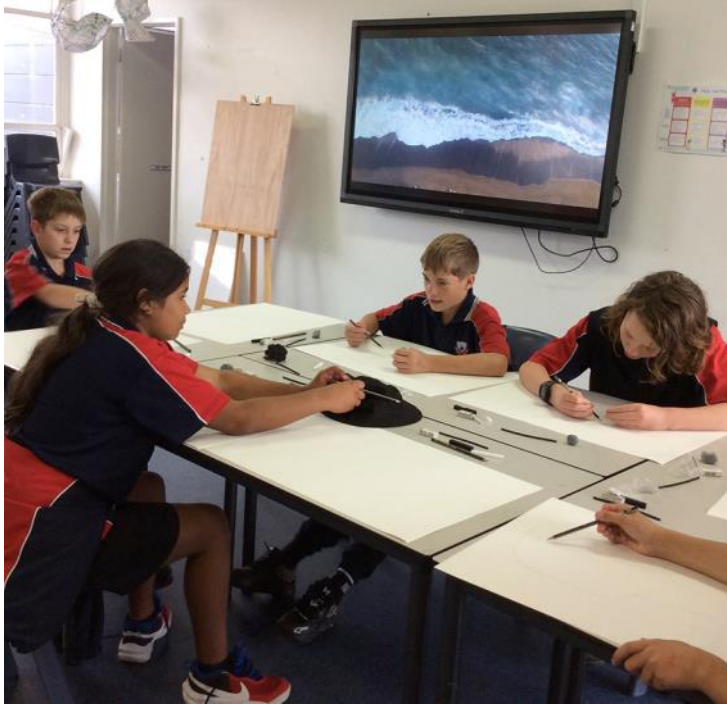


ART

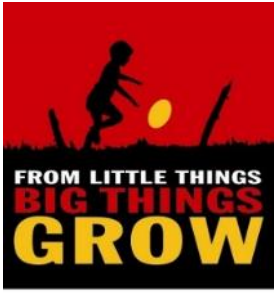
SURF ONLINE SAFE INCURSION

Thursday 22 June was a day for our Indigenous students to listen to our elders, sitting around a fire and yarning whilst enjoying some food.

Friday 23 June, the Aboriginal Education Team started first thing in the morning, cooking kangaroo stews, making dampers and setting up for our luncheon and activities in the lower quad.



During lunch and period five, students, staff and guests were able to enjoy a lunch and participate in activities with the help of external organisations. We had rock paintings, face paintings, canvases, sports, and games.

The theme this year was “FOR OUR ELDERS”. Our team along with the help of Mrs Wendy Allen set up the library as a restaurant vibe for our elders to sit and eat food whilst yarning amongst each other. After they were done, they joined in activities with our students.

SCIENCE

This month we are previewing the progress we are making in the new STEM (Science, Technology, Mathematics and Engineering) **Makerspace** in Room 24.

Thanks to a generous government grant we have been able to transform the room into a '*Science meets Design & Technology*' interactive learning space.

With the passion and leadership of Science Teacher Mrs Rachel Whitehouse, the drive of Curriculum Area Leader Miss Sarah Watson and the Corporate Services Manager Mrs Kara Flugge we now have a 21st Century facility that will allow our students to use...

critical thinking to analyse and solve problems and *design creative solutions.*

Miss Watson's and Mrs Whitehouse's vision has seen them plan some exciting projects and purchase some amazing equipment like Lego robotics, Micro bits, hand tools, electronic circuitry, 3D printers, laser cutter, soldering station to name a few.

They have planned exciting projects such as making rubber band powered cars in Year 7 and designing conveyor belt systems in Year 8.

The Year 7 students designed a rubber band powered car using CAD (Computer Assisted Design) software on computers in the graphics room, the staff used the laser cutter to produce the components of the model pieces from wood. Then each student assembled their car and tested their design.

Miss Watson holds the finished 'car', the laser cutter and Mrs Whitehouse holds the cut out 'flat pack panel' used to assemble the 'car'.

We acknowledge the involvement of the D&T team in allowing us free access to the Graphics room when required and Ms Heather Van Den Rydt for her in -servicing the Science team on the use of CAD software and the design process.

There are still some finishing touches to make but the Year 7 and 8 students have been enjoying their '*maker space*' for the last few weeks as we unpack and organise tools and materials and implement rules and protocols.

With the Year 7 and 8 students learning safe practices and the design process we are sure we will be able to expand the STEM program to encompass Years 7 – 10 in 2024.

Internet Safety: Teenagers

Why internet safety matters for teenagers

Teenagers use digital technology for everyday activities like keeping in touch with friends on social media, relaxing and doing schoolwork.

They also go online to look for support for physical or mental health problems and sometimes to experiment with ways of expressing themselves.

Because they're online so much without adult supervision, teenagers need to be able to **identify acceptable and unacceptable online content independently**.

They also need to know how to behave respectfully online and avoid online risks.

Talking about online content

Talking openly about your own social media and internet use and encouraging your child to do the same is important. It **helps your child feel they can talk to you** if they have a bad online experience.

Talking about **trends, online hoaxes and misinformation** will help your child to develop the ability to tell whether an app, post or website has good-quality information.

You and your child can find out how to recognise, avoid and report scams on Scamwatch.

You can also use the ABC's Fact Check to check the accuracy of claims by politicians, public figures, advocacy groups and institutions.
