






Katanning Senior High School is pleased to announce an upgrade to our school communication services. News, Events, Notices and general messages will now be sent using the Spacetalk Schools App.

Students have shown great interest in these sessions and participated with enthusiasm.

# SCIENCE

Year 7 students have started positively with a three week rotation through looking at forces, AutoCad programming and gravity, the students have adapted well to this and have worked well for all teachers.

The Year 8 students are studying the three different types of rock and looking at earth and space sciences.



Year 9 students have thrown themselves into earth and space science and have been enjoying looking

at the structure of the earth and how continents move.



Year 10 students are delving into the world of molecules and atoms and seem to be enjoying the experiments they've done so far this term in chemistry. The upper school ATAR and General classes are preparing for their exams and their externally set tasks, we wish them all the best for these!

Einstein-First 🐻 WESTERN

After various excursions, incursions and professional development, Einsteinian Physics is coming to Katanning Senior High School.

The Einstein First project has been rolled out by a team of specialists based at UWA.

Year 7 students have started the first module (of two), looking at gravity. In these lessons, students are learning through experimentation about curved spacetime on the Spacetime Simulator and the mathematics of curved geometry.

#### STEM

The Year 7 students are focusing on technology this term and have been creating elastic powered cars using AutoCAD and are continuing their coding journey on MicroBits.



Using their energy transformation knowledge from last term, Year 8 students are in the process of building a scale prototype of an energy efficient residential house. They are currently experimenting with different drawing styles to communicate their ideas.





Year 9 students are creating models of the earth's crust as a learning tool for earth and space. This understanding of movements created by the earths mantle, are fundamental in the design process of earthquake proof houses that will come later in the term.



Year 10 students are following a program based on the UNAA Global Citizenship and Sustainability Program Unit 1: Global Goals and the Local Community. They are applying the Double Diamond design process to propose solutions to local issues.

In the discover phase they have surveyed the school body to determine what issues exist in their local community that they may be able to help address.

# Year 10 Students Showcase Key Scenes from World War II through Dioramas

In an effort to bring history to life and engage students in a hands-on learning experience, the Year 10 students at our school recently embarked on а fascinating project of dioramas creating depicting key scenes from World War II. This immersive and creative activity allowed students to delve deeper into the historical events of this significant period, while also honing



their research, critical thinking, and artistic skills.

Dioramas have long been recognized as a powerful educational tool which enable students to visualize and understand historical events in a threedimensional format. By constructing miniature models of scenes from World War II, students were able to gain a deeper appreciation for the challenges faced by soldiers and civilians during this tumultuous time.

Once the scenes were chosen, students meticulously planned their dioramas; considering the scale, materials, and level of detail required. This planning phase encouraged critical thinking and problemsolving skills, as students had to determine how to accurately represent the scene within the constraints of their chosen materials.



With their research and planning complete, students began constructing their dioramas. They utilized a wide range of materials, including cardboard, clay, paint, and various craft supplies to bring their scenes to life along with materials they sourced from nature. The level of creativity displayed by the students was truly remarkable, as they incorporated intricate details such as miniature soldiers, vehicles, buildings, and landscapes. One student even constructed a moving and interactive bomber plane!



The creation of these World War II dioramas offered numerous educational benefits for the Year 10 students. By engaging in hands-on research, planning, and construction, students developed a range of skills, including research and critical thinking skills, artistic abilities, collaboration and communication, and historical understanding.



This project serves as a testament to the power of hands on learning and the importance of bringing history to life in the classroom.

# SCHOOL NURSE

Influenza, or the 'flu' is caused by an influenza virus. It is spread through the air when someone coughs, sneezes, or talks. It is also spread by touching something that has the virus on it and then touching your nose, eyes or mouth. Common symptoms include sore throat, cough, fever, headache, chills, tiredness and muscle aches.

People with the flu should rest and drink plenty of fluid. Use paracetamol in recommended doses if necessary but do not give children any medication containing aspirin.

Be sure to keep your child home from school while he or she is sick. If you require school work for your child contact the school to prepare some for you to collect.

The best way to prevent flu from spreading is by washing your hands regularly and after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose. Flu vaccines are available prior to winter starting. For more information, contact your GP or Katanning Immunisation Clinic.

#### Why should I consider having my child vaccinated against the flu?

The National Health and Medical Research Council, Australia's peak body for health advice, recommends annual vaccination for anyone six months of age or older who wants to reduce their chances of becoming ill with flu.

Annual flu vaccination is strongly recommended for anyone six months of age or older with a medical condition that places them at higher risk of severe illness from flu. Children and adults with heart, lung or kidney disease or a weakened immune system, are eligible for free flu vaccine through the National Immunisation Program.

Children without underlying medical conditions who become infected with flu can also develop serious illnesses. Flu can cause high fever and pneumonia, and make existing medical conditions worse. Flu can also cause convulsions and diarrhoea in children

Influenza viruses are always changing. Each year scientists try to match the strains of influenza viruses in the vaccine to those most likely to cause flu illnesses that year. It takes up to two weeks for protection to develop after vaccination against flu and protection lasts about a year

The seasonal flu vaccine is available on prescription or via GP and immunisation clinics and is provided free for certain groups. Flu vaccines are available prior to winter starting. For more information visit <u>healthywa.wa.gov.au/immunisation</u> or contact your GP or Immunisation Clinic.
